Wednesday, December 20, 2023 Katharina von Bora Luther, renewer of the church, died 1552

Born to an impoverished nobleman, Katie eventually took vows as a nun, but around age twenty-four she and several other nuns who were influenced by the writings of Martin Luther left the convent. Six children were born to Katie and Martin.

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OTHER READINGS: Isaiah 61:1-4, 8-11

Though the people had returned to Jerusalem from exile in Babylon, they continued to face hardship and oppression. In the language of the jubilee year described in Leviticus 25, the prophet, moved by the spirit of God, announces deliverance for those who are oppressed and comfort for those who mourn.

The reading begins:

¹The spirit of the Lord God is upon me, because the LORD has anointed me; he has sent me to bring good news to the oppressed, to bind up the brokenhearted, to proclaim liberty to the captives, and release to the prisoners; 2to proclaim the year of the LORD's favor, and the day of vengeance of our God; to comfort all who mourn; 3to provide for those who mourn in Zion — to give them a garland instead of ashes, the oil of gladness instead of mourning, the mantle of praise instead of a faint spirit. They will be called oaks of righteousness, the planting of the LORD, to display his glory. ⁴They shall build up the ancient ruins, they shall raise up the former devastations; they shall repair the ruined cities, the devastations of many generations. ⁸For I the LORD love justice, I hate robbery and wrongdoing; I will faithfully give them their recompense, and I will make an everlasting covenant with them. ⁹Their descendants shall be known among the nations, and their offspring among the peoples; all who see them shall acknowledge that they are a people whom the LORD has blessed. 10l will greatly rejoice in the LORD, my whole being shall exult in my God; for he has clothed me with the garments of salvation, he has covered me with the robe of righteousness, as a bridegroom decks himself with a garland, and as a bride adorns herself with her jewels. 11For as the earth brings forth its shoots, and as a garden causes what is sown in it to spring up, so the Lord GoD will cause righteousness and praise to spring up before all the nations.

PSALM: Psalm 126

¹When the LORD restored the fortunes of Zion, then were we like those who dream. ²Then was our mouth filled with laughter, and our tongue with shouts of joy. Then they said among the nations, "The LORD has done great things for them." ³The LORD has done great things for us, and we are glad indeed. ⁴Restore our fortunes, O LORD, like the watercourses of the Negeb. ⁵Those who sowed with tears will reap with songs of joy. ⁶Those who go out weeping, carrying the seed, will come again with joy, shouldering their sheaves.

OTHER READINGS: 1 Thessalonians 5:16-24

Paul concludes his letter to the Thessalonians by encouraging them to live lives of continual joy, prayer, and thanksgiving. The closing blessing is grounded in the hope of Christ's coming.

The reading begins:

¹⁶Rejoice always, ¹⁷pray without ceasing, ¹⁸give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you. ¹⁹Do not quench the Spirit. ²⁰Do not despise the words of prophets, ²¹but test everything; hold fast to what is good; ²²abstain from every form of evil. ²³May the God of peace himself sanctify you entirely; and may your spirit and soul and body be kept sound and blameless at the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ. ²⁴The one who calls you is faithful, and he will do this.

SERVICE OVERVIEW: GIVE WITNESS AND REJOICE

The third Sunday of Advent - also known as Gaudete (rejoice) is one in which the church has rejoiced as the advent of the Messiah draws nearer. Today's texts echo this rejoicing, this "we're almost there" excitement, in a multitude of ways. If the story sounds familiar — it is! We heard about John the baptizer in last week's gospel from Mark. What's the difference? Today's story goes deeper into the backstory: prophecies and expectations. Today's reading from Isaiah contains rich imagery of restoration and healing that Jesus will quote in Luke's gospel when he begins his ministry. The textual crossovers reinforce what we already know, that God's people in every generation long for restoration, repair, and new life.

THEOLOGICAL REFLECTION:

It is the third week of Advent, and we light three candles on the Advent wreath. While our society goes crazy with Christmas preparations and the northern hemisphere grows darker each day, we gather to wait for God to bring us into peace and light. Welcome to worship! Join John the Baptist to make a pathway for Christ. Come to the table for strength to focus on justice and mercy.

In his own way, John the Baptist calls for rejoicing by his acknowledgment that he is *not* what we are waiting for. John, like us, has a mission to bear witness, but when he says "I am not," we hear a clear contrast to all the ways Jesus will soon identify himself with the Father: "I am the bread of life." "I am the resurrection." "I am the good shepherd." Jesus will be all these things for God's people, but John's job (and ours) is simply to bear witness to the light.

How do we bear witness while still waiting? Can our joy in the midst of waiting be that very witness? In Advent we are not called to act as though we do not know how this story ends, as though Jesus' birth and life, death and resurrection, are still before us. What we *do* know is that sense of longing for God's salvation to be fulfilled, and the temptation to believe we have to save ourselves instead of waiting for God's purposes to be worked out in God's time. John reminds us that there can be joy in taking our proper place, pointing to Jesus without needing to *be* Jesus.

The second reading advises, "Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you." For anyone struggling with

grief, anger, and doubt, this advice can feel shallow and cold. Receive the invitation to accept the comfort of God's presence, even in painful situations. It is always God's desire to be with us. The Gospel of John points to Christ as the light and we embrace that hopefulness. The proximity to the winter solstice in the northern hemisphere also invites us to embrace the imagery of God's presence in our times of spiritual and literal darkness.

KID STUDY:

Do you notice all the Christmas lights around this time of year? They are a beautiful reminder as we prepare for the birth of Jesus that he is the light of the world. How do those lights work? What makes them light up? They have to be plugged in. One neat thing about Christmas lights is that if one string is plugged into an outlet, another string can be plugged into that first string to provide more and more lights.

Today we hear about John the Baptist. He was like the first string of Christmas lights. John was the first person to tell other people about Jesus, the Light Of The World. He told everyone to prepare a way for Jesus. When we share Jesus by being his hands and feet, we are like extra strings of Christmas lights that come to life when we are connected.

INDIVIDUAL REFLECTION:

It is interesting that the calculation theory of the origin of Christmas places the feast at the winter solstice in relationship to biblical accounts of the birth of the Baptist. The festival of the nativity of John the Baptist is on June 24, the old date for the summer solstice, which is the time of the greatest light in the northern hemisphere. But as the world's light wanes towards the time of greatest darkness at the winter solstice, we come to the feast of the true Light, brighter than the sun, given in the midst of our darkness. Advent is like John when its continuing decrease of light is made to bear witness to the coming of God's grace in the midst our need. John is present in our Advent when we know this about our observances and our days: They are not the light. But it is not that we simply turn toward the still coming One. Advent is not playacting, pretending to be the people waiting for the Messiah. Every Sunday assembly, even and especially during Advent, is a gathering in the power of the Spirit and in the presence of the risen Christ before the revealed face of God. "Waiting" is our human condition. This text heightens our waiting, turning us toward God and connecting us to the darkness that at every time of the year and in all religious systems waits for the transcendent one. - Gordon Lathrop [Gordon W.
