INTRODUCTION

Stir up your power, and come! The psalmist's plea in Psalm 80:2 has become familiar to us in the Advent prayers. Isaiah wants God to rip the heavens open. Both cry out for an apparently distant, angry God to show up, to save, to restore. When we hear Jesus describing the coming of the Son of Man with stars falling from heaven, it can sound dire and horrible, not like anything

we would ever hope for. But when we really look at the suffering of people God loves, we can share the hope that God would tear open the heavens and come.

FIRST READING: Isaiah 64:1-9

A Our first reading is from Isaiah, chapter 64, verses 1-9.

This lament comes from a people who have had their hopes shattered. The visions of a rebuilt Jerusalem and a renewed people of God, spoken of in Isaiah 40–55, have not been realized. Instead, the people experience ruin, conflict, and famine. This lament calls God to account — to be the God who has brought deliverance in the past.

The reading begins:

¹O that you would tear open the heavens and come down, so that the mountains would quake at your presence — ²as when fire kindles brushwood and the fire causes water to boil — to make your name known to your adversaries, so that the nations might tremble at your presence!

³When you did awesome deeds that we did not expect, you came down, the mountains quaked at your presence. ⁴From ages past no one has heard, no ear has perceived, no eye has seen any God besides you, who works for those who wait for him. ⁵You meet those who gladly do right, those who remember you in your ways. But you were angry, and we sinned; because you hid yourself we transgressed. ⁶We have all become like one who is unclean, and all our righteous deeds are like a filthy cloth. We all fade like a leaf, and our iniquities, like the wind,

take us away. ⁷There is no one who calls on your name, or attempts to take hold of you; for you have hidden your face from us, and have delivered us into the hand of our iniquity. ⁸Yet, O LORD, you are our Father; we are the clay, and you are our potter; we are all the work of your hand. ⁹Do not be exceedingly angry, O LORD, and do not remember iniquity forever. Now consider, we are all your people.

SECOND READING: 1 Corinthians 1:3-9

A Our second reading is from 1 Corinthians, chapter 1, verses 3-9.

As the Christians in Corinth await the advent of Jesus, Paul reminds them how the Lord has already enriched them through spiritual gifts and will continue to strengthen them until the coming day of the Lord.

UPCOMING COMMEMORATIONS

Sunday, December 3, 2023 Francis Xavier, missionary to Asia, died 1552

A native of the Basque region of Spain, Xavier became a missionary to India, Southeast Asia, Japan, and the Philippines. He also helped to found the Society of Jesus (Jesuits).

Monday, December 4, 2023 John of Damascus, theologian and hymnwriter, died around 749

A monk in an abbey near Jerusalem, John wrote many hymns as well as theological works. One of his works, The Fount of Wisdom, remained influential for centuries.

Wednesday, December 6, 2023 Nicholas, Bishop of Myra, died around 342

Little is known about Nicholas, except that he was a bishop in present-day Turkey. According to legend, he was famous for his giving to the poor, and so has become a symbol of anonymous gift-giving.

Thursday, December 7, 2023 Ambrose, Bishop of Milan, died 397

While a governor of northern Italy, Ambrose was elected bishop of Milan on the same day he was baptized. He was a famous preacher, a writer of hymns we still sing today, and helped lead St. Augustine to faith.

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SERVICE OVERVIEW: OLD PROBLEMS AND NEW BEGINNINGS

The promise of Advent is that God is always at work in the world, bringing new beginnings and a new creation to people and powers long bent on destruction. Yet, because we live in the generation that exists between the "already" of Christ's resurrection and the "not yet" of God's full restoration of the creation, we cannot know when that final day will arrive. Instead of becoming preoccupied with the end times, we are counseled to live our lives in a state of preparedness. Trust that your home is God's home. Trust that God is coming once again to dwell within you. This trust is the strength that will sustain you as we all wait for the revealing of our Lord Jesus Christ.

THEOLOGICAL REFLECTION:

It is the first week the church year and the first week of Advent. As we light the first candle on the Advent wreath, we begin a year-long reading from the gospel of Mark. Welcome to worship! Christ is "advancing" towards us. In the past, God came to us in the life of Jesus. In the present, God comes especially in word and sacrament. In the future, even if there is disaster, God will come to gather us into life.

Jesus speaks of the coming of the Son of Man as something imminent, and illustrates his point via the image of a servant doorkeeper who is to keep watch and stay on the lookout as the household waits for the master's return. How might we think of ourselves as the doorkeeper? There is a pause in our faith journeys as we await the full revealing of Jesus, and especially at this moment, we are given spiritual gifts for this time of anticipation. How are your gifts a grace not only for the church, but for the people to whom we carry our witness of death and resurrection?

We regularly see or experience the end result of other people's work. We dine at a restaurant, but the boiling of water that cooked the noodles happens in a hidden kitchen. We purchase a piece of pottery, but do not see the artist at work in the studio. Today's passage from Isaiah includes images of God as the fire that makes water boil and God as the potter. In both cases the suggestion is that the world experiences God indirectly. Do you see yourself and others as conduits of God's grace? Think of how powerful it is - especially in times where we or others may feel God's absence.

Being awake and alert to possibilities does not always remove the element of surprise. Indeed, God's grace is surprising. If we were not surprised by it, we might be able to manage ourselves to grace or begin to expect it in ways that feel more entitled than free. Reflect on the surprising nature of grace where you may have experienced surprising new creation and transformation.

KID STUDY:

It is the season of Advent and we are waiting. Soon we will experience Christmas decorations, holiday parties, and winter break from school. The season of Advent is like the branch of a tree in winter. It is dormant. It may look dead, but life is resting in the twigs, awaiting spring. God always comes to us at Sunday worship, but God also is hidden in places that surprise us. As we wait for Jesus to be born, remember to take time to watch for Jesus. Prepare for Jesus by making room for him in your home, in your mind, and in your heart. Jesus will be here soon!

INDIVIDUAL REFLECTION:

Some people see the future Day of Judgment, whether by bomb or Bible, as a disastrous time. For them, that Day will be a time of weeping, wailing and gnashing of teeth. For most of us the Day of Judgment, the End of Time, the Second Coming of Christ, whatever you want to call it, is something without any real meaning. We don't look forward to it with dread, because we don't look forward to it at all. Yet Advent calls us to hope for the coming of Christ. This positive hope comes from knowing that we already belong to Christ and already live in communion with him and each other. Through grace we are made ready meet Christ, both in our daily lives and at the Day of Judgment. Advent reminds us to take time to watch, to make space for that waiting which is so important to our spiritual journey, and to look to tomorrow in positive hope, living expectantly for the coming of the Christ. - Linda L.
