INTRODUCTION

On Ash Wednesday the church began its journey toward baptismal immersion in the death and resurrection of Christ. This year, the Sundays in Lent lead us to focus on five covenants God makes in the Hebrew Scriptures and to use them as lenses through which to view baptism. First Peter connects the way God saved Noah's family in the flood with the way God saves us

through the water of baptism. The baptismal covenant is made with us individually, but the new life we are given in baptism is for the sake of the whole world.



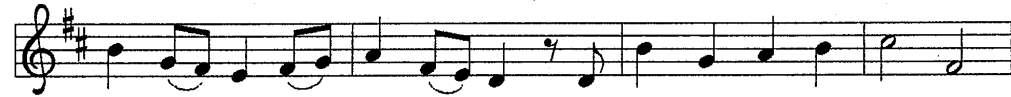

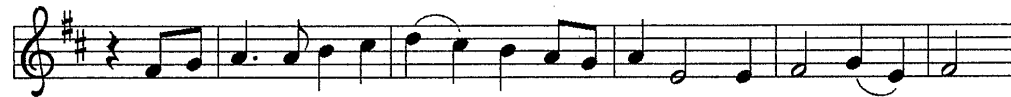

FIRST READING: Genesis 9:8-17

A Our first reading is from Genesis, chapter 9, verses 8-17.

Today's reading is the conclusion to the flood story. Because of human sin, God destroys the earth by flood, saving only Noah, his family, and the animals on the ark. Yet divine destruction gives way to divine commitment. As in the first creation, God blesses humanity and establishes a covenant with all creatures.

The reading begins:

⁸God said to Noah and to his sons with him, ⁹"As for me, I am establishing my covenant with you and your descendants after you, ¹⁰and with every living creature that is with you, the birds, the domestic animals, and every animal of the earth with you, as many as came out of the ark. ¹¹I establish my covenant with you, that never again shall all flesh be cut off by the waters of a flood, and never again shall there be a flood to destroy the earth." ¹²God said, "This is the sign of the covenant that I make between me and you and every living creature that is with you, for all future generations: ¹³I have set my bow in the clouds, and it shall be a sign of the covenant between me and the earth. ¹⁴When I bring clouds over the earth and the bow is seen in the clouds, ¹⁵I will remember my covenant that is between me and you and every living creature of all flesh; and the waters shall never again become a flood to destroy all flesh. ¹⁶When the bow is in the clouds, I will see it and remember the everlasting covenant between God and every living creature of all flesh that is on the earth." ¹⁷God said to Noah, "This is the sign of the covenant that I have established between me and all flesh that is on the earth."


¹⁸Christ also suffered for sins once for all, the righteous for the unrighteous, in order to bring you to God. He was put to death in the flesh, but made alive in the spirit, ¹⁹in which also he went and made a proclamation to the spirits in prison, ²⁰who in former times did not obey, when God waited patiently in the days of Noah, during the building of the ark, in which a few, that is, eight persons, were saved through water. ²¹And baptism, which this prefigured, now saves you — not as a removal of dirt from the body, but as an appeal to God for a good conscience, through the resurrection of Jesus Christ, ²²who has gone into heaven and is at the right hand of God, with angels, authorities, and powers made subject to him.

UPCOMING COMMEMORATIONS

Sunday, February 18, 2024 Martin Luther, renewer of the church, died 1546
Though he began his adult church life as a simple Augustinian monk, Luther challenged the abuses he saw in the church, and his work eventually led to the Protestant Reformation. Luther's accomplishments included liturgical reform, translation of the Bible, and creation of the Small and Large Catechisms.

Friday, February 23, 2024 Polycarp, Bishop of Smyrna, martyr, died 156
Because he is said to have been known by John, the author of Revelation, as well as the important early church fathers Irenaeus and Ignatius, Polycarp serves as a vital link in church history. He was burned at the stake at age 86 for refusing to renounce his faith.
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SERVICE OVERVIEW: THE POWER OF WATER

Water is an integral part of the created order. Water sustains and fosters life; too little or too much water can end it. A glance at the news headlines points out the destructive power of water’s presence or absence: In the United States alone, 2011 saw severe droughts afflict several parts of the country. On the opposite end of the spectrum, floods ravaged the Plains states in the spring and summer, displacing from their homes many people who live near rivers and streams. For those dwelling on or near the Eastern Seaboard, hurricane season is a tense time every year. Yet we need water as much or more than we need food, shelter, or the other “staples” of human life. Since ancient times we have established our communities near sources of water. We cannot survive long without it. The Holy Spirit descends on Jesus only after his baptism by John, yet the Spirit immediately drives Jesus into the desert - a place defined by its lack of water. Through water and the word, in baptism our old, sinful self is put to death, and we are reborn as children of God. But the current that flows through these paradoxes is this: in death and life, in flood and drought, God remains faithful. God’s mercy and steadfast love “are from everlasting.”

THEOLOGICAL REFLECTION:

Each year on the first week in Lent we hear about Jesus being tested in the wilderness. In this way Jesus joined with us, who are also, one way or another, tested in some wilderness. As we move through the forty days of Lent, we omit the worship days in that count. Worship days are a celebration of Christ’s resurrection! Welcome to worship! Today we are both in Lent and beyond Lent.

Each year, Lent begins with an account from one of the synoptic gospels of the testing of Jesus. Jesus was truly human, suffering from the devil’s temptations no less than we, and so he can stand by us when we are tested. We too are accompanied with the Spirit of God, and we can take comfort from the angels attending us.

Mark’s entire focus is the baptism, with no debate between family about its righteousness as occurs in Matthew. It is an incredible experience: the appearance of the incarnate God, the tearing of the heavens, forty days of trials, and the beginning of Jesus’ ministry all happen in seven short verses. When miraculous and transformative work takes place, we can sometimes get lost in the details. Can we follow the example of Mark’s gospel and focus on what is most true?

Lent is the oldest of Christian liturgical seasons, yet every year it is introduced anew. Children begin gaining greater understanding. People new to this church or new to church overall may question the changes in service music, language, paraments, and themes. What differences stand out to you? Does anything require explanation? Ask questions! Lent is a time of self-reflection and study designed to invite you to experience the Word with new eyes and new ears whether you are new to the church or have heard the stories many times.

In the journey of Lent, both as mirror to Christ’s temptation in the wilderness as well as doorway to our own lifelong walk with forgiveness, it is essential to remember that faithful practice does

not searate the body from the mind or heart or spirit or soul. Lent does not demand severe self-discipline leading to knowledge or insight. Rather, knowledge and insight are gained by daily reconciliation. Remember, your human body is made of blessed earth and imbued with the image of God.

KID STUDY:

Imagine you are heading out on a trip. What do you pack to prepare for your time away? You'll need to stay safe and meet your basic needs while you are away. The season of Lent lasts for 40 days and ends with Easter. During this time, remember that God alone is the one who daily gives you what you need. God’s promise, or *covenant*, provides us with much more than just the essentials! Each day God gives mercy, forgiveness, grace, and love that we do not have to earn. How might we accept these promises? How might we then share these promises with other people?

INDIVIDUAL REFLECTION:

Mystical and salutary is this number, forty. For when in the beginning human iniquity covered the face of the earth, God, dissolving the clouds of heaven for the space of this number of days, covered the whole earth with a flood. The deluge of those days must be called a mercy, in that through it iniquity was crushed and justice upheld. The deluge came through mercy as a sort of baptism, in which the face of the earth was renewed. For as Noah was saved in the ark, while human iniquity was drowned in the flood, so by the waters of baptism the church is borne close to heaven, and faith reigns on earth, as coming forth from the ark of the Savior. Just so as Noah received his children into the ark, so do we also earnestly desire to receive our children into this ark. - Maximus of Turin [Maximus, in Sunday Sermons of the Great Fathers, II, 93-94.]
