INTRODUCTION

The second covenant in this year's Lenten readings is the one made with Abraham and Sarah: God's promise to make them the ancestors of many, with whom God will remain in everlasting covenant. Paul says this promise comes to all who share Abraham's faith in the God who brings life into being where there was no life. We receive this baptismal promise of resurrection life in

faith. Sarah and Abraham receive new names as a sign of the covenant, and we too get new identities in baptism, as we put on Christ.

FIRST READING: Genesis 17:1-7, 15-16

A Our first reading is from Genesis, chapter 17, verses 1-7 and 15-16.

As with Noah, God makes an everlasting covenant with Abraham and Sarah. God promises this old couple that they will be the ancestors of nations, though they have no child together. God will miraculously bring forth new life from Sarah's womb. The name changes emphasize the firmness of God's promise.

The reading begins:

¹When Abram was ninety-nine years old, the LORD appeared to Abram, and said to him, "I am God Almighty; walk before me, and be blameless. ²And I will make my covenant between me and you, and will make you exceedingly numerous." ³Then Abram fell on his face; and God said to him, ⁴"As for me, this is my covenant with you: You shall be the ancestor of a multitude of nations. ⁵No longer shall your name be Abram, but your name shall be Abraham; for I have made you the ancestor of a multitude of nations. ⁶I will make you exceedingly fruitful; and I will make nations of you, and kings shall come from you. ⁷I will establish my covenant between me and you, and your offspring after you throughout their generations, for an everlasting covenant, to be God to you and to your offspring after you." ¹⁵God said to Abraham, "As for Sarai your wife, you shall not call her Sarai, but Sarah shall be her name. ¹⁶I will bless her, and moreover I will give you a son by her. I will bless her, and she shall give rise to nations; kings of peoples shall come from her."

PSALM: Psalm 22:23-31

- A The Psalm today is from Psalm 22, verses 23-31. We will read the Psalm responsively. The congregation will please respond by reading the words in bold print.
- ²³You who fear the LORD, give praise! All you of Jacob's line, give glory. Stand in awe of the LORD, all you offspring of Israel.
- ²⁴For the LORD does not despise nor abhor the poor in their poverty; neither is the LORD's face hidden from them; but when they cry out, the LORD hears them.
- ²⁵From you comes my praise in the great assembly; I will perform my vows in the sight of those who fear the LORD.
- ²⁶The poor shall eat and be satisfied, let those who seek the LORD give praise! May your hearts live forever!
- ²⁷All the ends of the earth shall remember and turn to the LORD; all the families of nations shall bow before God.
- ²⁸For dominion belongs to the LORD, who rules over the nations.
- ²⁹Indeed, all who sleep in the earth shall bow down in worship; all who go down to the dust, though they be dead, shall kneel before the LORD.
- ³⁰Their descendants shall serve the LORD, whom they shall proclaim to generations to come.
- ³¹They shall proclaim God's deliverance to a people yet unborn, saying to them, "The LORD has acted!"

SECOND READING: Romans 4:13-25

A Our second reading is from Romans, chapter 4, verses 13-25.

Paul presents Abraham as the example for how a person comes into a right relationship with God not through works of the law but through faith. Though Abraham and Sarah were far too old for bearing children, Abraham trusted that God would accomplish what God had promised to accomplish.

The reading begins:

13The promise that he would inherit the world did not come to Abraham or to his descendants through the law but through the righteousness of faith. ¹⁴If it is the adherents of the law who are to be the heirs, faith is null and the promise is void. ¹⁵For the law brings wrath; but where there is no law, neither is there violation. ¹⁶For this reason it depends on faith, in order that the promise may rest on grace and be guaranteed to all his descendants, not only to the adherents of the law but also to those who share the faith of Abraham (for he is the father of all of us, ¹⁷as it is written, "I have made you the father of many nations") — in the presence of the God in whom he believed, who gives life to the dead and calls into existence the things that do not exist. ¹⁸Hoping against hope, he believed that he would become "the father of many nations," according to what was said, "So numerous shall your descendants be." ¹⁹He did not weaken in faith when he considered his own body, which was already as good as dead (for he was about a hundred years old), or when he considered the barrenness of Sarah's womb. ²⁰No distrust made him waver concerning the promise of God, but he grew strong in his faith as he gave glory

to God, ²¹being fully convinced that God was able to do what he had promised. ²²Therefore his faith "was reckoned to him as righteousness." ²³Now the words, "it was reckoned to him," were written not for his sake alone, ²⁴but for ours also. It will be reckoned to us who believe in him who raised Jesus our Lord from the dead, ²⁵who was handed over to death for our trespasses and was raised for our justification.

of them the Son of Man will also be ashamed when he comes in the glory of his Father with the holy angels."







UPCOMING COMMEMORATIONS

Sunday, February 25, 2024 Elizabeth Fedde, deaconess, died 1921

Born in Norway and trained there as a deaconess. Fedde was asked to come and minister to the poor and to seamen in New York City. She established the Deaconess House in Brooklyn as well as Deaconess Hospital in Minneapolis.

Friday, March 1, 2024 George Herbert, hymnwriter, died 1633

An excellent scholar, Herbert served briefly in the English parliament, then became a parish priest. He was known for devoted care of his parishioners, as well as for writing poetry and hymns, including "Come, my way, my truth, my life." He died at age 40.

Saturday, March 2, 2024 John Wesley, died 1791; Charles Wesley, died 1788; renewers of the church

These brothers led a revival originally intended to remain within the Church of England, one that involved frequent communion and advocacy for the poor. Except for a brief time in America, they worked in England. Charles was also a prolific hymn writer. After their deaths, their work led to the formation of the Methodist Church.

SERVICE OVERVIEW: PROMISES, PROMISES

The story of God's relationship with God's people is a story of promises fulfilled. We hear about God's covenant with Sarah and Abraham in today's Genesis reading, then about the fulfillment of that covenant in the New Testament texts. As Paul reminds us in Romans, we are the multitude of nations that were promised to Abraham! We are his descendants in faith! We are "Kings of peoples" descended from Sarah's offspring. Jesus Christ, the King of kings, is Lord of all through his death and resurrection.

THEOLOGICAL REFLECTION:

Today Jesus predicts his own death. He calls all of his disciples, including us, to follow him. We are likened to Abraham and Sarah, who are called to have faith in the promises of God. The season of Lent is the time for the renewal of our baptismal covenant. Welcome to worship! Together we renew our communal covenant of grace by our faith. Follow Christ to the cross and into the resurrection.

From generation to generation, God is steadfast. No matter how many ages pass or how often we turn away, God remains faithful. This is the great hope of our faith: no matter how often we stray or how great our sin, God persists in loving us. Jesus Christ binds us to God through our baptism into his death. In worship, confession, affirmation of baptism, and communion, we continually remember the lengths to which God goes to keep covenant with us. The promise of salvation extends even into the future. The psalmist reminds us: that our children and our children's children will proclaim God's salvation to generations yet unborn. Jesus' descendants are not biological but social and theological, grafted into God's family through the inclusiveness of grace.

We are given the opportunity to either remain faithful to God's word and promise, or to concede to the world's way of doing things. When Jesus calls Peter "Satan" in the gospel text today, he is not labeling Peter as the embodiment of ultimate evil, as the term is so often applied in contemporary culture, but instead naming Peter's action of "setting your mind not on divine things but on human things" as a temptation to choose the world's path. Jesus will have to renounce this temptation multiple times throughout his ministry, if not as clearly as he does here. United with Christ in our baptismal covenant, like Jesus we also face the ongoing temptation of having our calling subverted by the way the world expects us to behave.

Abraham's faithfulness was centered in his willingness to trust God for the parts of God's promise to him that he could not control, and to claim agency for the parts of the covenant that

he had power over through obedience. This discernment is a crucial part of faithfulness, but is something we often struggle with in a culture that encourages us to control other people's actions and choices while refusing to accept full responsibility for our own. Discernment and balance are necessary within the covenant God has made with us.

KID STUDY:

Jesus announced to his disciples that he was going to suffer and die. The disciples did not like hearing that. Peter tried to tell Jesus that He was wrong, but Jesus explained to Peter that it was God's plan for this to happen. Jesus was a servant who knew that glorifying God would only come through suffering and pain. The disciples didn't understand this part of the plan, and had a hard time accepting it.

There are a lot of things in our lives that are difficult or challenging for us to accept. We might question what God is doing, but Jesus promises to be with us and always help us get through. As God's servants, we are called to act in the world even though we do not know what will happen. We will have many experiences, good and bad. Through our faith, we can go out into the world with bravery. We will receive the courage we need when we believe that God is leading and supporting us.

INDIVIDUAL REFLECTION:

There is no other way to life and real inward peace except the way of the holy cross, and of daily dying to self. Go where you like, look for what you like, you will not find a higher way above or a safer way below than the way of the holy cross. The cross is always close by and waits for you everywhere. You cannot escape it, wherever you may run. If you carry your cross with gladness, it will carry you and lead you to that longed-for goal where there will be no more suffering. If you carry it grudgingly, you will make it a burden and weigh yourself down, but all the same you will have to bear it. If you throw one cross aside, you will certainly find another, and possibly one that is heavier to bear. - Thomas á Kempis [Thomas á Kempis, The Imitation of Christ, ed. Betty I. Knott (London: Collins, 1973), 103-104.]
