Lenten journey to the baptismal waters of Easter. Hungry for God's mercy, we receive the bread of life to nourish us for the days ahead.

OTHER READINGS: Genesis 2:15-17; 3:1-7

The annual harvest festival, called the Feast of Weeks, provides the setting for this reading. This festival celebrates the first fruits of the produce of the land offered back to God in thanks. In this text, worshippers announce God's gracious acts on behalf of Israel.

The reading begins:

Chapter 2:

¹⁵The LORD God took the man and put him in the garden of Eden to till it and keep it. ¹⁶And the LORD God commanded the man, "You may freely eat of every tree of the garden; ¹⁷but of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil you shall not eat, for in the day that you eat of it you shall die."

Chapter 3:

¹Now the serpent was more crafty than any other wild animal that the LORD God had made. He said to the woman, "Did God say, 'You shall not eat from any tree in the garden?'" ²The woman said to the serpent, "We may eat of the fruit of the trees in the garden; ³but God said, 'You shall not eat of the fruit of the tree that is in the middle of the garden, nor shall you touch it, or you shall die.'" ⁴But the serpent said to the woman, "You will not die; ⁵for God knows that when you eat of it your eyes will be opened, and you will be like God, knowing good and evil." ⁶So when the woman saw that the tree was good for food, and that it was a delight to the eyes, and that the tree was to be desired to make one wise, she took of its fruit and ate; and she also gave some to her husband, who was with her, and he ate. ⁷Then the eyes of both were opened, and they knew that they were naked; and they sewed fig leaves together and made loincloths for themselves.

PSALM: Psalm 32

¹Happy are they whose transgressions are forgiven, and whose sin is put away! ²Happy are they to whom the LORD imputes no guilt, and in whose spirit there is no guile! ³While I held my tongue, my bones withered away, because of my groaning all day long. ⁴For your hand was heavy upon me day and night; my moisture was dried up as in the heat of summer. ⁵Then I acknowledged my sin to you, and did not conceal my guilt. I said, "I will confess my transgressions to the LORD." Then you forgave me the guilt of my sin. ⁶Therefore all the faithful will make their prayers to you in time of trouble; when the great waters overflow, they shall not reach them. ⁷You are my hiding-place; you preserve me from trouble; you surround me with shouts of deliverance. ⁸"I will instruct you and teach you in the way that you should go; I will guide you with my eye. ⁹Do not be like horse or mule, which have no understanding; who must be fitted with bit and bridle, or else they will not stay near you." ¹⁰Great are the tribulations of the

wicked; but mercy embraces those who trust in the LORD. ¹¹Be glad, you righteous, and rejoice in the LORD; shout for joy, all who are true of heart.

OTHER READINGS: Romans 5:12-19

Paul reminds the Christians at Rome of the foundation of their creed, the confession of faith in the risen Christ as Lord.

The reading begins:

¹²Just as sin came into the world through one man, and death came through sin, and so death spread to all because all have sinned — ¹³sin was indeed in the world before the law, but sin is not reckoned when there is no law. ¹⁴Yet death exercised dominion from Adam to Moses, even over those whose sins were not like the transgression of Adam, who is a type of the one who was to come. ¹⁵But the free gift is not like the trespass. For if the many died through the one man's trespass, much more surely have the grace of God and the free gift in the grace of the one man, Jesus Christ, abounded for the many. ¹⁶And the free gift is not like the effect of the one man's sin. For the judgment following one trespass brought condemnation, but the free gift following many trespasses brings justification. ¹⁷If, because of the one man's trespass, death exercised dominion through that one, much more surely will those who receive the abundance of grace and the free gift of righteousness exercise dominion in life through the one man, Jesus Christ. ¹⁸Therefore just as one man's trespass led to condemnation for all, so one man's act of righteousness leads to justification and life for all. ¹⁹For just as by the one man's disobedience the many were made sinners, so by the one man's obedience the many will be made righteous.

SERVICE OVERVIEW:

This Lent we are called to expunge the fantastical images of the devil from our minds and think seriously about the real presence of evil in our world. We know firsthand about the sin that caused, causes, and will cause suffering to us, our loved ones, our neighbors, our global communities, and creation itself. Sin is real; suffering is real; evil is real; indeed, the devil is real. This oppressive, tangible reality is as real as the air we breathe - felt but not always seen. Greed, envy, rage, hatred, war, discrimination, and apathy are just some of the ways the devil's forces wreak havoc upon us. These forces have one goal and one goal only: to turn us away from the will of God.

Matthew's gospel reorients us to the truth of the devil's power, and calls us to name Satan's presence in the world. In the wilderness Jesus encounters an evil as real as its opposite, resurrection. The great tempter seeks to undermine Jesus' mission before he even begins; testimony that evil has much to fear of our Jesus! Nonetheless, Jesus will not be dissuaded. "*Away with you, Satan!*" proclaims the redeemer of the cosmos. Thus, the Lenten journey begins. It is a journey that takes us to the cross, where the devil is named and crushed underfoot.

THEOLOGICAL REFLECTION:

The first week in Lent tells the story of Jesus' temptation in the wilderness. Jesus was truly human, suffering from temptations no less than we, so he can stand by us when we are tempted. We too conquer evil with the power of God's word: and that word for us is embodied in Christ. Welcome to worship! Hear the Word. Eat the food of God. Receive the Spirit's strength to live in light of your baptism.

Jesus, upon his baptism, departed for forty days in the wilderness where he was tempted by Satan. This is the beginning of Jesus' public ministry. Instead of impatience about what he has been called to do, he devotes a measure of time to prayer and deprivation in a space removed from the general population. Satan urges Jesus to forget his own identity and lineage. Perhaps what looks impossible to us – a starving Jesus refusing to turn stones into bread, is something that Jesus was able to do because he was able to recognize the foundation that grounded him against temptation.

All of us face temptation. Advice to simply avoid it may not help. What will help, though, is to reflect on our responsibilities as people of faith. Allow a scripturally faithful response to ground you and grant you the foundation you need. The familiar rhythms of scripture continue to point us to what trust and obedience look like through Jesus' example.

In place of marking Lent by giving up tangible items like caffeine or sweets, what might happen if you try to try to surrender constructs such as weakness and fear? Instead of limiting your television or computer time or following a healthier diet, why not give up impatience, criticism, or being motivated by others' judgment?

KID STUDY:

Our culture markets and sells stuff by making you think you are not enough. If you think you are lacking something, surely that product they are selling will make you more likable or more popular. Those messages tell a lie. Every person, including you, is a beloved of God and, thereby, is enough. Jesus reminds you and every person (including grown ups) who they are in Christ - children of God! Don't be tempted to think you aren't enough. Lent is a time when we ask questions about and study what it means to be God's beloved as we hear the story of Jesus' journey to the cross.

INDIVIDUAL REFLECTION:

The Lord formed these words in my soul: "Therewith is the fiend overcome." When he said these words, our Lord was referring to his blessed passion. On account of this, I laughed loud and long, which made those who were around me laugh too, and their laughter was a pleasure to me. I understood that we may laugh, comforting ourselves and rejoicing in God that the devil has been overcome. - Julian of Norwich [Julian of Norwich, Revelations of Divine Love, ed.
