INTRODUCTION

All the baptized have a calling in God's world. God calls not just pastors and deacons but also the youngest child, like Samuel. The story of the calling of Nathanael plays with the idea of place. Nathanael initially dismisses Jesus because he comes from Nazareth. But where we come from isn't important; it's where — or rather whom — we come to. Jesus refers to Jacob, who had a vision in a place he called "the house of God, and . . . the gate of heaven" (Gen. 28:17). Jesus says he himself is the place where Nathanael will meet God.

FIRST READING: 1 Samuel 3:1-10

A Our first reading is from 1 Samuel, chapter 3, verses 1-10.

At a time when visions are rare and unexpected, the LORD comes to Samuel and calls him to speak the divine word. Though just a boy, Samuel responds to God obediently, as Eli the priest has taught him to respond. This marks the beginning of Samuel's prophetic ministry.

The reading begins:

¹Now the boy Samuel was ministering to the LORD under Eli. The word of the LORD was rare in those days; visions were not widespread. ²At that time Eli, whose eyesight had begun to grow dim so that he could not see, was lying down in his room; ³the lamp of God had not yet gone out, and Samuel was lying down in the temple of the LORD, where the ark of God was. ⁴Then the LORD called, "Samuel! Samuel!" and he said, "Here I am!" ⁵and ran to Eli, and said, "Here I am, for you called me." But he said, "I did not call; lie down again." So he went and lay down. ⁶The LORD called again, "Samuel!" Samuel got up and went to Eli, and said, "Here I am, for you called me." But he said, "I did not call, my son; lie down again." ¬Now Samuel did not yet know the LORD, and the word of the LORD had not yet been revealed to him. ³The LORD called Samuel again, a third time. And he got up and went to Eli, and said, "Here I am, for you called me." Then Eli perceived that the LORD was calling the boy. ¹Therefore Eli said to Samuel, "Go, lie down; and if he calls you, you shall say, 'Speak, LORD, for your servant is listening.'" So Samuel went and lay down in his place. ¹¹Now the LORD came and stood there, calling as before, "Samuel! Samuel!" And Samuel said, "Speak, for your servant is listening."

PSALM: Psalm 139:1-6. 13-18

A The Psalm today is from Psalm 139, verses 1-6 and 13-18. We will read the Psalm responsively. The congregation will please respond by reading the words in bold print.

SECOND READING: 1 Corinthians 6:12-20

A Our second reading is from 1 Corinthians, chapter 6, verses 12-20.

Paul helps the Corinthians understand that God has claimed the entirety of their lives through the death of Christ. Hence Christian relationships and conduct, including areas of human sexuality, are to reflect the reality that we belong to Christ and that the Holy Spirit lives within us.

The reading begins:

¹²"All things are lawful for me," but not all things are beneficial. "All things are lawful for me," but I will not be dominated by anything. ¹³"Food is meant for the stomach and the stomach for food," and God will destroy both one and the other. The body is meant not for fornication but for the Lord, and the Lord for the body. ¹⁴And God raised the Lord and will also raise us by his power. ¹⁵Do you not know that your bodies are members of Christ? Should I therefore take the members of Christ and make them members of a prostitute? Never! ¹⁶Do you not know that whoever is united to a prostitute becomes one body with her? For it is said, "The two shall be one flesh." ¹⁷But anyone united to the Lord becomes one spirit with him. ¹⁸Shun fornication! Every sin that a person commits is outside the body; but the fornicator sins against the body itself. ¹⁹Or do you not know that your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit within you, which you have from God, and that you are not your own? ²⁰For you were bought with a price; therefore glorify God in your body.

UPCOMING COMMEMORATIONS

Monday, January 15, 2024 Martin Luther King Jr., renewer of society, martyr, died 1968 An American prophet of justice among races and nations, King was an eloquent preacher, a leader of the nonviolent resistance to race-segregated society, and recipient of the Nobel Peace Prize in 1964. Born on this date, he was assassinated on April 4, 1968.

Wednesday, January 17, 2024 Antony of Egypt, renewer of the church, died around 356 One of the earliest of the Egyptian desert fathers, Antony gave away his sizeable inheritance and became a hermit. Later he became leader of a group of monks who devoted themselves to prayer, worship, and labor.

Wednesday, January 17, 2024 Pachomius, renewer of the church, died 346
Born in Egypt, Pachomius became a Christian while a soldier. He became a hermit (a solitary monk) and organized others into a religious community. His rule for monasteries influenced later ones in both the Eastern and Western churches.

Thursday, January 18, 2024 Confession of Peter

Today the church remembers the apostle Peter's great acknowledgement of Jesus as "the Christ, the Son of the living God." This festival serves as a fitting beginning to the week in which we particularly pray that all Christians might be united in faith and witness.

Friday, January 19, 2024 Henry, Bishop of Uppsala, martyr, died 1156

When Erik, King of Sweden, determined to invade Finland for the purpose of converting the people there to Christianity, Henry went with him. Henry is recognized as the patron saint of Finland.

SERVICE OVERVIEW: COME AND SEE. FOLLOW ME.

We live in a culture of invitation. Television invites us to join complicated story arcs so that we feel connected to the characters. Commercials invite us to see their product as a new movement and invite us to join it. We are invited to join groups on Facebook and invited into chat rooms and blog responses. The number of social networks is exploding as we are invited into ever expanding ways to connect.

Invitation is an essential part of our walk of faith, but here we frequently see ourselves not as the invited but rather the one who is supposed to be doing the inviting. We can misuse invitation, maybe using the phrase "invite Jesus into your heart," which often results in the misunderstanding that we are carrying a little bit of Jesus wherever we go. But today's gospel emphasizes not invitation as our call to others to join the walk of faith but rather Jesus' invitation to us to follow him. Jesus' invitation is not that we carry him with us but rather that we follow

where he would lead. When Christ invites Philip to "follow me," may we hear that invitation in our own ears!

THEOLOGICAL REFLECTION:

Last week was Jesus' baptism, and this week he calls the disciples. Just like the disciples, after our baptism we are called to follow Him. Listen to the scripture as it presents the meaning and presence of Christ. John's presentation of several Christological titles (son of Joseph, Rabbi, Son of God, King of Israel, and Son of Man) is tied to the call of the disciples. Welcome to worship! Respond to the call! Explore the meaning of each of these titles and the salvation to which each name points. Come and see!

Finish this sentence: "Can anything good come out of _____?" The way we fill in the blank reveals the implicit biases we carry toward certain places and the people who come from them. In honest reflection, what part of town, part of the country, or part of the world flashes to mind with that question? For the disciple Nathanael, the answer is the small backwater village of Nazareth. Yet Nathanael is amazed as he encounters God in Jesus the Nazarene. Throughout scripture, God is revealed in unlikely people and places, challenging biases and crumbling prejudices. What is a bias of yours that needs challenging today?

Philip invites Nathanael to come and see for himself who Jesus is, and the trajectory of Nathanael's life is changed forever. In Philip we have a model for Christian evangelism. Like the boy Samuel in our first reading, we are messengers who are given God's word in order to bear it to others. First Samuel reads, "The word of the Lord was rare in those days; visions were not widespread." Why? What kept people from encountering God? Could it be that those charged with bearing God's word stopped saying, "Come and see"? How does worship invite the us to come and see Jesus? More importantly, how do we bear the invitation to encounter God to our wider community? The text says that Samuel did not yet know the Lord, yet he receives and bears God's word to the seasoned priest Eli. How do we in the church, who presume ourselves the mediators of the holy, stay open to receiving God's word from those we assume do not yet know God?

Jesus heralds Nathanael as "an Israelite in whom there is no deceit." When Nathanael asks how Jesus knows him, Jesus says he saw him under the fig tree before Phillip called him. But it was under the fig tree where Nathanael expressed extreme skepticism about Jesus' prospects as the Messiah, and even disparaged his hometown. Is Jesus commending Nathanael for his honesty? Is he saying that a healthy dose of skepticism is something he wants on his team? Jesus does not scold Nathanel, but praises him! His initial reaction and concerns about Jesus are not disqualifying to his discipleship. That is great news for anyone who expresses doubt and even cynicism along on their jorneys of faith. Not all of Christ's disciples immediately follow without some convincing. When Nathanael comes to Jesus, despite his doubts, he encounters something that captures him enough to believe.

KID STUDY:

Nathaniel is minding his own business when his friend Philip tells him that they have found the Messiah. At that time, everyone had been waiting for hundreds of years for the Messiah, who was supposed to be the champion God promised to save Israel. Philip runs up to Nathanel saying, "We've found him! This is the guy Moses wrote about. This is the guy God promised through the prophets. He's here! His name is Jesus, and he's from Nazareth!" Instead of being excited, though, Nathanel seems cynical. He replies, "Can anything good come out of Nazareth?" Nazareth was a small, ordinary village of about 400 people, nowhere of any importance. It's not even mentioned in the Old Testament. It's not somewhere heroes come from, is it? It's certainly not somewhere Nathanel would expect to find God. It's not an accident that when God chooses to break into our world, it's in a small town, through regular people like

As followers of Jesus, we are invited to see people the way God sees them - as beloved children no matter where they're from, to see all people as we see ourselves. We are called to stand up for the rights and dignity of all of God's children. We are called to invite people to rethink the way they see other people that are different from them. That is what God is doing in the world. When we don't place limits on who other people are, we are part of the good things God is doing.

INDIVIDUAL REFLECTION:

Every one of us forms an idea of Christ that is limited and incomplete. It is cut according to our own measure. We make him not only the incarnation of God, but also the incarnation of the things we and our society and our part of society happen to live for. Therefore, it is not enough merely to imitate the Christ we have in our imagination. We read the gospels not merely to get a picture or an idea of Christ, but to enter in and pass through the words of revelation to establish, by faith, a vital contact with the Christ who dwells in our souls as God. If we depend on our own ideas, own judgment and our own efforts to reproduce the life of Christ, we will only act out some kind of pious charade which will ultimately scare everybody we meet because it will be so stiff and artificial and so dead. It is the Spirit of God that must teach us who Christ is and form Christ in us and transform us into other Christs. For me to become Christ is to enter into the life of the whole Christ, the mystical body made up of the head and the members, Christ and all who are incorporated in him by his Spirit. - Thomas Merton [Thomas Merton, New Seeds of Contemplation (New York: New Directions, 1961), 155-57]
