INTRODUCTION

Our re-creation in baptism is an image of the Genesis creation, where the Spirit of God moved over the waters. Both Mark's gospel and the story in Acts make clear that it is the Spirit's movement that distinguishes Jesus' baptism from John's. The Spirit has come upon us as upon Jesus and the Ephesians, calling us God's beloved children and setting us on Jesus' mission to re-create the world in the image of God's vision of justice and peace.

FIRST READING: Genesis 1:1-5

A Our first reading is from Genesis, chapter 1, verses 1-5.

Out of chaos, God brings order. Out of the formless void, God brings light. This familiar story was good news for the Israelites, who experienced much chaos in their history. It remains good news for us. God created and continues to create new life.

SECOND READING: Acts 19:1-7

A Our second reading is from Acts, chapter 19, verses 1-7.

In Ephesus, Paul encounters people who had received John's baptism of repentance but had never heard of the Holy Spirit or of baptism in the name of Jesus. After Paul baptizes them, the Holy Spirit comes upon them and empowers them with gifts of the Spirit.

¹While Apollos was in Corinth, Paul passed through the interior regions and came to Ephesus, where he found some disciples. ²He said to them, "Did you receive the Holy Spirit when you became believers?" They replied, "No, we have not even heard that there is a Holy Spirit." ³Then he said, "Into what then were you baptized?" They answered, "Into John's baptism." ⁴Paul said, "John baptized with the baptism of repentance, telling the people to believe in the one who was to come after him, that is, in Jesus." 5On hearing this, they were baptized in the name of the Lord Jesus. 6When Paul had laid his hands on them, the Holy Spirit came upon them, and they spoke in tongues and prophesied — ⁷altogether there were about twelve of them. Mark's gospel reports the story of Jesus' baptism with some irony: the one on whom the Spirit descends is himself the one who will baptize others with the Holy Spirit.





SERVICE OVERVIEW: BREATH OF GOD

Breath figures frequently in Scripture. God's breath or Spirit hovers over the chaos in creation in Genesis. Breath or Spirit enters the nostrils of the created in the story. Breath and Spirit is breathed on to the disciples by Jesus when he appears to them after his resurrection. In the gospel text, as Jesus rises from the waters, the Spirit, the breath of God, descends like a dove. Jesus, having held his breath under the water, rises as a model of death and life for us, breathing in the life of the Spirit. He is a risen and claimed by God as the beloved with whom God is pleased.

THEOLOGICAL REFLECTION:

Today's gospel is about Jesus being baptized by John the baptizer. The voice of God speaks from heaven, and the Spirit descends like a dove. Welcome to worship! This story is also about us: we too have been baptized, we have heard God's loving call, and we have received the Holy Spirit.

Breathing is two things: breathing in and breathing out. You can hold your breath, but there is no way to hold it forever. Consider how this reflects the Spirit's power in Jesus and then in our baptism. In baptism, the gift is not just one of repentance and forgiveness, but, as the Acts text emphasizes, also involves the Spirit living and acting in the baptized. While it is a gift for our own lives, like the gift of breathing in, it is also encouragement and life, a breathing out of the Spirit into the world. Baptism is both for our own sake and for the world. In our baptism, we breathe in forgiveness and reconciliation and breathe out the Spirit in our life and works. That's the full life of the baptized disciple.

People from the whole Judean countryside and "all the people of Jerusalem" were going out to the wilderness to be baptized by John and to confess their sins. What were they drawn to? What was it about this prophet in camel hair that compelled the masses to spiritual revival? John took the symbolic act of cleansing and did something new with it to provide a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. The word "sin" often gets tossed around as an abusive threat, but it can also be a gift that leads to repentance and restoration of relationship. We have this gift in our liturgy. At worship, you are invited to confess sin in the form of things done and left undone, and then hear the promise of God's forgiveness. How can we share this gift in a way that inspires instead of threatens?

Our baptismal liturgy is a road map for discipleship. It is no accident that on so many occasions in the life of our congregation, we affirm the promises made in our baptism. Our lives are modeled after what it means to live among God's faithful people; hear the word of God and share in the Lord's Supper; proclaim the good news of God in Christ through word and deed; serve all people; and strive for justice and peace in all the earth.

The most consistent connection running through the readings is Spirit. In the original Hebrew and Greek, the word for Spirit also means "wind" and "breath." As the wind swept over the

waters of Genesis (the first reading), how is the wind from God moving around you right now? Is it blowing gently as a breeze or making you zip up your jacket? The wind within you may move past your vocal cords in a loud shout, a song of praise, or a gentle whisper.

KID STUDY:

The Christmas season is over, and now we are in the season of Epiphany when Jesus comes into the world to do his work. Jesus' cousin John had been preaching in the wild lands by the River Jordan. John told everyone to get their lives ready because God was sending the Messiah. John helped them get ready by bringing them down into the Jordan River and dipping them in the water. It was a kind of special bath. The water reminded them that they could start over, living the way God asked them to live. And they would be ready when God's Messiah came. One day, Jesus himself came out to the wild lands around the River Jordan. He came to John, just like everybody else. He went down into the river, just like everybody else. He had John dip him into the waters of the Jordan, just like everybody else. When Jesus came out of the water, his heart was all full of big thoughts and big feelings. He knew he would now start his work of teaching about God's Kingdom. Soon he would be healing sick people, feeding hungry people, and teaching people about God so they could be free.

INDIVIDUAL REFLECTION:

You were led to the holy pool of divine baptism. And each of you was asked, whether you believed in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. You made that saving confession, and descended three times into the water, and ascended again - here also, in a hidden and figurative way, pointing at the three-day burial of Christ. For as our Savior passed three days and three nights in the heart of the earth, so you also, in your first ascent out of the water, represented the first day of Christ in the earth, and by your descent, the night. For as they who are in the night see no more, but they who are in the day remain in the light, so in descending you saw nothing, as in the night, but in ascending again, we were as in the day. Let no one suppose that baptism is merely the grace of remission of sins, as was John's baptism. No: baptism conveys to us the gift of the Holy Spirit, and God, who has presented you, as it were, alive from the dead, is able to grant you to walk in newness of life. - Cyril of Jerusalem [Cyril of Jerusalem, Lectures on the Christian Sacraments, ed.
