SCRIPTURE READING: Romans 8:26-39

A Our scripture reading is from Romans, chapter 8, verses 26-39. *These words celebrate the depth of God's actions for us. Through Christ's death for us and the activity of the Spirit praying for us, we are fused to God's love poured out in Jesus Christ. Nothing, not even death itself, is able to separate us from such incredible divine love.*

The reading begins:

²⁶The Spirit helps us in our weakness; for we do not know how to pray as we ought, but that very Spirit intercedes with sighs too deep for words. ²⁷And God, who searches the heart, knows what is the mind of the Spirit, because the Spirit intercedes for the saints according to the will of God.

²⁸We know that all things work together for good for those who love God, who are called according to his purpose. ²⁹For those whom he foreknew he also predestined to be conformed to the image of his Son, in order that he might be the firstborn within a large family. ³⁰And those whom he predestined he also called; and those whom he called he also justified; and those whom he justified he also glorified. ³¹What then are we to say about these things? If God is for us, who is against us? ³²He who did not withhold his own Son, but gave him up for all of us, will he not with him also give us everything else? ³³Who will bring any charge against God's elect? It is God who justifies. ³⁴Who is to condemn? It is Christ Jesus, who died, yes, who was raised, who is at the right hand of God, who indeed intercedes for us. ³⁵Who will separate us from the love of Christ? Will hardship, or distress, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or peril, or sword? ³⁶As it is written, "For your sake we are being killed all day long; we are accounted as sheep to be slaughtered." ³⁷No, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him who loved us. ³⁸For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, ³⁹nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord.

OTHER READINGS: 1 Kings 3:5-12

Because Solomon did not ask for long life, riches, or the defeat of his enemies, God gave him what he asked for: wisdom to govern the people well.

The reading begins:

⁵At Gibeon the LORD appeared to Solomon in a dream by night; and God said, “Ask what I should give you.” ⁶And Solomon said, “You have shown great and steadfast love to your servant my father David, because he walked before you in faithfulness, in righteousness, and in uprightness of heart toward you; and you have kept for him this great and steadfast love, and have given him a son to sit on his throne today. ⁷And now, O LORD my God, you have made your servant king in place of my father David, although I am only a little child; I do not know how to go out or come in. ⁸And your servant is in the midst of the people whom you have chosen, a great people, so numerous they cannot be numbered or counted. ⁹Give your servant therefore an understanding mind to govern your people, able to discern between good and evil; for who can govern this your great people?” ¹⁰It pleased the Lord that Solomon had asked this. ¹¹God said to him, “Because you have asked this, and have not asked for yourself long life or riches, or for the life of your enemies, but have asked for yourself understanding to discern what is right, ¹²I now do according to your word. Indeed I give you a wise and discerning mind; no one like you has been before you and no one like you shall arise after you.”

PSALM: Psalm 119:129-136

¹²⁹Your decrees are wonderful; therefore I obey them with all my heart. ¹³⁰When your word is opened it gives light; it gives understanding to the simple. ¹³¹I open my mouth and pant because I long for your commandments. ¹³²Turn to me and be gracious to me, as you always do to those who love your name. ¹³³Order my footsteps in your word; let no iniquity have dominion over me. ¹³⁴Rescue me from those who oppress me, and I will keep your commandments. ¹³⁵Let your face shine upon your servant and teach me your statutes. ¹³⁶My eyes shed streams of tears, because people do not keep your teaching.

GOSPEL: Matthew 13:31-33, 44-52

Throughout Matthew’s gospel, Jesus and his disciples proclaim the good news that “the kingdom of heaven is near!” Here, Jesus offers several brief parables that explore the implications of this announcement for people’s lives.

The gospel begins:

³¹[Jesus] put before [the crowds] another parable: “The kingdom of heaven is like a mustard seed that someone took and sowed in his field; ³²it is the smallest of all the seeds, but when it has grown it is the greatest of shrubs and becomes a tree, so that the birds of the air come and make nests in its branches.” ³³He told them another parable: “The kingdom of heaven is like yeast that a woman took and mixed in with three measures of flour until all of it was leavened.” ⁴⁴“The kingdom of heaven is like treasure hidden in a field, which someone found and hid; then in his joy he goes and sells all that he has and buys that field. ⁴⁵“Again, the kingdom of heaven is like a merchant in search of fine pearls; ⁴⁶on finding one pearl of great value, he went and sold all that he had and bought it. ⁴⁷“Again, the kingdom of heaven is like a net that was thrown into the sea and caught fish of every kind; ⁴⁸when it was full, they drew it ashore, sat down, and put the good into baskets but threw out the bad. ⁴⁹So it will be at the end of the age. The angels will come out and separate the evil from the righteous ⁵⁰and throw them into the furnace of fire, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth. ⁵¹“Have you understood all this?” They answered, “Yes.” ⁵²And he said to them, “Therefore every scribe who has been trained for the kingdom of heaven is like the master of a household who brings out of his treasure what is new and what is old.”

SERVICE OVERVIEW: THE KINGDOM OF HEAVEN IS LIKE...

A string of parables describe the kingdom of heaven, and then we hear Jesus’ question: “*Have you understood all this?*” The mustard seed, yeast, hidden treasure, pearls - these bring good news of growth and joy and riches. Then come the fish, the furnace of fire, and the weeping and gnashing of teeth. Once again this week we hear of a God of both mercy and justice. Once again there is good news to be heard in Paul’s letter to the church at Rome - *nothing will ever separate us from God’s love in Christ Jesus*. How will we reconcile these two images of God?

THEOLOGICAL REFLECTION:

The gospel reading today includes six very brief parables about things described as “the kingdom of heaven.” Which picture of the mercy of God is most appealing to you? As we move from the word to the table for the Lord’s Supper, take this treasure into yourself.

Kingdoms are not common in our world. For most of us, we recall images of British royalty, jeweled crowns, and palaces. At the time the Gospel of Matthew was written, the people were subject to the empire (kingdom) of Rome. Perhaps the writer intended to contrast the oppressive rule of Rome with a vision of heaven’s kingdom of love and mercy.

Many people hear the term kingdom of heaven and immediately think of an alternate realm in the afterlife. We should understand the heaven described in scripture as an inbreaking of God’s dominion of love and freedom that impacts our lives here and now. Believers are called to respond to the good news of the kingdom of heaven’s arrival by engaging in the world’s needs, rather than passively awaiting a heavenly afterlife.

Why does Jesus so often use parables as a teaching tool? Jesus makes surprising comparisons between holy things and ordinary things, breaking open our everyday understanding and inviting us to explore them. The ordinary things Jesus uses to describe God's kingdom all have an aspect of hiddenness to them, so the kingdom is something we must search for ourselves. Jesus' parables about treasure prompt reflection on how we find and measure things of real worth. Peace and contentment carry more value than even the most precious material objects. Today's parables are all about small things that turn into something big to remind us that even a small seed, a small action, can make a huge impact.

KID STUDY:

Some stories begin with "Once upon a time..." Jesus' stories often began with "The kingdom of God is like..." One of today's stories describes a woman making bread. Have you ever baked fresh bread? You have to have yeast to bake bread. Yeast is a living organism. It is "activated" when it is given food (sugar) and water. When that happens, we can sit back and watch it come to life! As the yeast eat the sugar, they give off gas. This is what makes bread rise and become fluffy! The tiny speck of yeast has now changed and grown and helped the bread dough expand. In the same way, this is what happens when we share God's love with those around us. It grows and becomes bigger and bigger.

INDIVIDUAL REFLECTION:

"The kingdom of heaven is like yeast that a woman took and hid in three measures of flour until all of it was leavened." In a single sentence several ancient stories are evoked, and yet, by the introduction of a few new terms the traditional sense of these stories is radically transformed. Three measures of flour is an ephah, somewhere around a bushel. That is a lot of flour. It is three measures or an ephah that Abraham causes to be prepared for the angels of God at Mamre. In the new temple that is imagined and described by the prophet Ezekiel, the grain offerings will be an ephah of flour baked by the priests apart from the people. Yet the one who welcomes the outsiders to table says this: the dominion of God is like leavened holy bread baked by a woman. No wonder the leaven is hid. All the meal - enough for Abraham, enough for the new temple, enough for meeting God - is leavened, to be feast for all who long to meet with God in the same way that Jesus' unclean death is made to be such a feast. This dominion of God, then, is not what had been expected: it comes with a radical grace to the outsiders and the sinners. - Gordon Lathrop [Gordon W. Lathrop, Holy Things: A Liturgical Theology (Minneapolis: Fortress, 1993), 24-25.]
