INTRODUCTION

The fourth of the Old Testament promises providing a baptismal lens this Lent is the promise God makes to Moses: those who look on the bronze serpent will live. In today's gospel Jesus says he will be lifted up on the cross like the serpent, so that those who look to him in faith will live. When we receive the sign of the cross in baptism, that cross becomes the sign we can look to in faith for healing, for restored relationship to God, for hope when we are dying.

UPCOMING COMMEMORATIONS

Sunday, March 10, 2024 Harriet Tubman, died 1913; Sojourner Truth, died 1883; renewers of society

Harriet Tubman, born into slavery, helped about 300 others to escape slavery until the institution was abolished. Sojourner Truth, whose birth name was Isabella, was freed after slavery was abolished, and discerned a call to be a preacher. Taking the name Sojourner Truth, she set out on an evangelistic journey, where people found her testimony to be deeply moving.

Tuesday, March 12, 2024 Gregory the Great, Bishop of Rome, died 604

Born into wealth and power, Gregory was for a time the chief administrator of the city of Rome. Giving this up for a life in the church, he was elected pope in 590. He influenced public worship through the establishment of a lectionary and prayers to correlate with the readings. Gregorian chant is named in his honor.

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OTHER READINGS: Numbers 21:4-9

Though God provides food and water for the Israelites in the wilderness, they whine and grumble. They forget about the salvation they experienced in the exodus. God punishes them for their sin, but when they repent God also provides a means of healing: a bronze serpent lifted up on a pole.

The reading begins:

⁴From Mount Hor [the Israelites] set out by the way to the Red Sea, to go around the land of Edom; but the people became impatient on the way. ⁵The people spoke against God and

against Moses, "Why have you brought us up out of Egypt to die in the wilderness? For there is no food and no water, and we detest this miserable food." ⁶Then the Lord sent poisonous serpents among the people, and they bit the people, so that many Israelites died. ⁷The people came to Moses and said, "We have sinned by speaking against the Lord and against you; pray to the Lord to take away the serpents from us." So Moses prayed for the people. ⁸And the Lord said to Moses, "Make a poisonous serpent, and set it on a pole; and everyone who is bitten shall look at it and live." ⁹So Moses made a serpent of bronze, and put it upon a pole; and whenever a serpent bit someone, that person would look at the serpent of bronze and live.

PSALM: Psalm 107:1-3, 17-22

¹Give thanks to the LORD, for the LORD is good, for God's mercy endures forever. ²Let the redeemed of the LORD proclaim that God redeemed them from the hand of the foe, ³gathering them in from the lands; from the east and from the west, from the north and from the south. ¹⁷Some were fools and took rebellious paths; through their sins they were afflicted. ¹⁸They loathed all manner of food and drew near to death's door. ¹⁹Then in their trouble they cried to the LORD and you delivered them from their distress. ²⁰You sent forth your word and healed them and rescued them from the grave. ²¹Let them give thanks to you, LORD, for your steadfast love and your wonderful works for all people. ²²Let them offer sacrifices of thanksgiving and tell of your deeds with shouts of joy.

OTHER READINGS: Ephesians 2:1-10

While we were dead in our sinfulness, God acted to make us alive as a gift of grace in Christ Jesus. We are saved not by what we do but by grace through faith. Thus our good works are really a reflection of God's grace at work in our lives.

The reading begins:

¹You were dead through the trespasses and sins ²in which you once lived, following the course of this world, following the ruler of the power of the air, the spirit that is now at work among those who are disobedient. ³All of us once lived among them in the passions of our flesh, following the desires of flesh and senses, and we were by nature children of wrath, like everyone else. ⁴But God, who is rich in mercy, out of the great love with which he loved us ⁵even when we were dead through our trespasses, made us alive together with Christ — by grace you have been saved —6and raised us up with him and seated us with him in the heavenly places in Christ Jesus, ³so that in the ages to come he might show the immeasurable riches of his grace in kindness toward us in Christ Jesus. ³For by grace you have been saved through faith, and this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God — ³not the result of works, so that no one may boast. ¹oFor we are what he has made us, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand to be our way of life.

SERVICE OVERVIEW: THE COSMIC LOVE OF GOD

Our world and our lives include darkness and sin, evil and brokenness. But God's love for us and for the world is complete, passionate, and sacrificial. God is not willing to settle for part of the world, or for some of us. Instead of condemning all that is not pleasing, God gave God's own

son, lifted up on the cross, so that all might have the possibility of eternal life. The light of God's love shining down from the cross demonstrates the totality of God's love and proclaims God's desire to transform the dark places in this world into places of light, healing, and salvation.

THEOLOGICAL REFLECTION:

It is the fourth week in Lent, and we continue the focus on baptism as a key to the Christian life. The gospel describes God as choosing to save rather than to condemn. The world, which does not know God, is loved by God. Welcome to worship! Remember your own baptism. Renew your life to live more fully in the light of baptismal grace.

Being "made alive together with Christ..." opens the door for profound blessing and healing within and outside of the Christian community. Do you offer such blessing and healing to everyone? Have you ever received it from someone else? Help comes directly from God through the hands of loved ones without judgment. This is also described as being the light of the world, sharing the light of Christ, and shining your light for the world to see. There is darkness in this world, but according to John, eternal life begins now, in and among the baptized.

Do you think that to be the light of the world, to let your light so shine before men, you have to be whole, strong, and perfect? That's impossible to do. Leonard Cohen sings: "Ring the bells that still can ring/Forget your perfect offering/There's a crack in everything/That's how the light gets in." In other words, it is exactly at our points of weakness, of pain, of brokenness and of insufficiency that force us, like those who originally followed Jesus, to stand in the need of God. To stand in the need of the true light.

Those cracks are bad choices, anxiety, depression, from addiction, struggle and remorse. Those cracks are what lets the light of God's love in but *they are also how the light gets out!* As we reflect on last week's reading of the ten commandments, don't miss the fact that Jesus does not say "here are the conditions you must meet to be the salt of the Earth." He does not say, "here are the standards of wholeness you must fulfill in order to be light for the world." He sees our pain. He sees that we have been broken open and tells us that we have God within us, the God whose light scatters the darkness.

KID STUDY:

Jesus invites us to look at his words and actions so that we can learn from him for what God's kingdom looks like. Also, so we can learn how to live in God's kingdom. The reason he did those actions and shared his words of teaching was because he was filled with God's love. It's a love that supports and gives life. When we look to Jesus and learn about God from Jesus, then we, too, will shine with God's love and light. Just like offered God's love, healing, and forgiveness, we, too, are to offer God's love, healing, and forgiveness. When we shine God's light and share God's love with others, we are helping them better see God, just like Jesus helps us to better see God.

INDIVIDUAL REFLECTION:

When the Israelites were frustrated and disgusted and rebelling against the circumstances of their own forced march to freedom, Moses needed something to get them going again. It was a bronze serpent, raised up like a standard, an artificial symbol of whatever it was, a seraph, that had afflicted them. It became the effective agent of their healing and forgiveness, the sign that injected hope and a renewed will to keep going toward the Promised Land... So the preacher has to get Jesus up there before people's consciousness in a call for their faith; telling all of us who share the responsibility for moving the Christian community on in life that we must proclaim the Lord as the source of hope and energy in a world of confounding circumstances and in the face of the death that defeats all our hopes. At the heart of our own faith is a conviction in God's unfailing love; for generations of recurring cynicism, indifference, and despair have never had the last word or given the definitive comment on our human situation. The love of God is persistent, and the Word of God always finds a new voice in the most hopeless circumstances.
