FIRST READING: Jeremiah 31:31-34

A Our first reading is from Jeremiah, chapter 31, verses 31-34.

The Judeans in Babylon blamed their exile on their ancestors, who had broken the covenant established at Sinai. Here the prophet looks to a day when God will make a new covenant with the people. There will be no need to teach the law, because God will write it on their hearts.

The reading begins:

³¹The days are surely coming, says the LORD, when I will make a new covenant with the house of Israel and the house of Judah. ³²It will not be like the covenant that I made with their ancestors when I took them by the hand to bring them out of the land of Egypt — a covenant that they broke, though I was their husband, says the LORD. ³³But this is the covenant that I will make with the house of Israel after those days, says the LORD: I will put my law within them, and I will write it on their hearts; and I will be their God, and they shall be my people. ³⁴No longer shall they teach one another, or say to each other, "Know the LORD," for they shall all know me, from the least of them to the greatest, says the LORD; for I will forgive their iniquity, and remember their sin no more.

PSALM: Psalm 51:1-12

A The Psalm today is from Psalm 51, verses 1-12. We will read the Psalm responsively. The congregation will please respond by reading the words in bold print.

⁵Indeed, I was born steeped in wickedness, a sinner from my mother's womb.

⁸Let me hear joy and gladness; that the body you have broken may rejoice.

¹Have mercy on me, O God, according to your steadfast love; in your great compassion blot out my offenses.

⁴Against you only have I sinned and done what is evil in your sight; so you are justified when you speak and right in your judgment.

¹¹Cast me not away from your presence, and take not your Holy Spirit from me.

¹²Restore to me the joy of your salvation and sustain me with your bountiful Spirit.

SECOND READING: Hebrews 5:5-10

A Our second reading is from Hebrews, chapter 5, verses 5-10.

Using priestly imagery and references to the Old Testament, the author explains how Christ lived in trusting obedience to God, and so God has made Christ the source of our eternal salvation.

The reading begins:

⁵Christ did not glorify himself in becoming a high priest, but was appointed by the one who said to him, "You are my Son, today I have begotten you"; ⁶as he says also in another place, "You are a priest forever, according to the order of Melchizedek." ⁷In the days of his flesh, Jesus offered up prayers and supplications, with loud cries and tears, to the one who was able to save him from death, and he was heard because of his reverent submission. ⁸Although he was a Son, he learned obedience through what he suffered; ⁹and having been made perfect, he became the source of eternal salvation for all who obey him, ¹⁰having been designated by God a high priest according to the order of Melchizedek.

No, it is for this reason that I have come to this hour. ²⁸Father, glorify your name." Then a voice came from heaven, "I have glorified it, and I will glorify it again." ²⁹The crowd standing there heard it and said that it was thunder. Others said, "An angel has spoken to him." ³⁰Jesus answered, "This voice has come for your sake, not for mine. ³¹Now is the judgment of this world; now the ruler of this world will be driven out. ³²And I, when I am lifted up from the earth, will draw all people to myself." ³³He said this to indicate the kind of death he was to die.



UPCOMING COMMEMORATIONS

Sunday, March 17, 2024 Patrick, bishop, missionary to Ireland, died 461

A native of Britain, Patrick was kidnapped by pirates at age sixteen and sold into slavery in Ireland. After a few years, he escaped, returned home, and entered the ministry. Returning to Ireland, he successfully served as a bishop and missionary there.

Tuesday, March 19, 2024 Joseph, Guardian of Jesus

Though the Bible tells us little about the husband of Jesus' mother Mary, we know that he was a carpenter or builder by trade. He is also shown as being devoted both to God and to Mary and Jesus. It is assumed that he died before Jesus became an adult.

Thursday, March 21, 2024 Thomas Cranmer, Bishop of Canterbury, martyr, died 1556 Cranmer's lasting achievement is contributing to and overseeing the creation of the Book of Common Prayer, which remains (in revised form) the worship book of the Anglican Communion. He was burned at the stake under Queen Mary for his support of the Protestant Reformation.

Friday, March 22, 2024 Jonathan Edwards, teacher, missionary to American Indians, died 1758

A Puritan minister in Connecticut, Edwards is remembered as being a great preacher. Though his most famous sermon talks at length about hell, he was more concerned with God's love. He served both as missionary to the Housatonic people in Massachusetts, and as president of the future Princeton University.

SERVICE OVERVIEW: THE ATTRACTION OF THE REPELLENT CROSS

Two themes vie for attention in the readings: divine forgiveness (and human sinfulness that makes it necessary), and the mysterious power of the cross. The connection point for the two themes is intimate service to the other. Jeremiah tells us that God will come closer to us than a husband to a wife - directly into our hearts! Deep within this mystery we will be known, forgiven, and loved. Jesus then promises that through his life in us, we will be drawn into a similar emptying of selves as we enter richly into the lives of others so that they too will know the joy and relief of being known and loved. In this way, confession leads to mission!

THEOLOGICAL REFLECTION:

Today Jesus likens himself to a grain of wheat: once it is buried in the earth it comes alive to bear much fruit. He uses the image of a dead seed coming to life as a metaphor for his own crucifixion and being "lifted up" on our behalf. Welcome to worship! Hear the word and receive the meal as God's covenant is renewed in you!

The end of Lent is near. Along with the Greeks in today's gospel reading, we too wish to see Jesus. Greek dress and culture were very different from Jewish people. Now at the turn toward Christ's passion narrative, it is Greeks (Gentiles or those who are not Jewish) who come to Jesus while the Jewish authorities are plotting his death. His indirect language foreshadowing

his death comes with a promise that he will draw all people to himself. To really see Jesus, though, we must look up. Jesus will be lifted up on the cross in order to draw everyone to God.

Do you avoid attending services during holy week? It is difficult to hear the sad and violent story of Jesus' crucifixion, but don't lose sight of the fact that the cross is where we encounter God's loving, self-giving heart. The story of Christ's passion is a story of God's love for us as God turns a symbol of death into one of life, mercy, and love. The symbolic grain of wheat depicts God's way of bringing life from what seems death. With the Greeks, we too wish to see Jesus. To do so we must look up, for Jesus has been lifted up on the cross in order to draw everyone to God. The "hour" of salvation is imminent and it is Christ's death.

Understand this theological trajectory. Jesus is preparing his disciples for more than his death. The crucifixion also gives witness to what we know lies beyond - resurrection and ascension. Much more difficult is to imagine the truth of resurrection and the comfort of ascension.

KID STUDY:

Have you ever played with magnets? A magnet has great power and will draw many objects to itself. Today Jesus tells the people that when he is lifted up, he will draw everyone to himself. The drawing power of a magnet can be very strong, but that's nothing compared to the drawing power of Jesus! When we see his great love, we are drawn to him and want to live our lives as his hands and feet loving and caring for our neighbors. We still don't get it right and fall short, but Jesus always draws us back to him. There is no power stronger than the love of Jesus.

INDIVIDUAL REFLECTION:

You must have already heard about God's marvels manifested in the way silk originates. The silkworms come from seeds about the size of little grains of pepper. When the warm weather comes and the leaves begin to appear on the mulberry tree, the seeds start to live, for they are dead until then. The worms nourish themselves on the mulberry leaves until, having grown to full size, they settle on some twigs. There with their little mouths they go about spinning the silk and making some very thick little cocoons in which they enclose themselves. The silkworm, which is fat and ugly, then dies, and a little white butterfly, which is very pretty, comes forth from the cocoon. Once this silkworm is grown, it begins to spin the silk and build the house wherein it will die. I would like to point out that this house is Christ, since he is our dwelling place and we ourselves can build so as to place ourselves in it. Let's be quick to weave this little cocoon by taking away our self-love and self-will, our attachment to any earthly thing, and by performing deeds of penance, prayer, mortification, and obedience. Let this silkworm die, as it does in completing what it was created to do. And you will see how we see God, as well as ourselves placed inside God's grandeur, as is this little silkworm within its cocoon. - Teresa of Avila [Teresa of Avila, The Interior Castle, trans.
