






FIRST READING: Amos 5:18-24

A Our first reading is from Amos, chapter 5, verses 18-24.

In the days of Amos, people thought that the day of the LORD would be a time of great victory, but Amos announced that it would be a day of darkness, not light. He said liturgy is no substitute for obedience. The LORD demands justice and righteousness in the community.

resurrection to eternal life when Christ comes again. Paul reassures them with the word of hope that all Christians, living or dead, will be raised into everlasting life with Christ.

²Let those who seek my life be put to shame and confounded; let those who take pleasure in my misfortune draw back and be disgraced.

³Let those who say to me "Aha!" and gloat over me turn back because of their shame.

⁴Let all who seek you rejoice and be glad in you; let those who love your salvation say forever, "Great is the LORD!"

¹³We do not want you to be uninformed, brothers and sisters, about those who have died, so that you may not grieve as others do who have no hope. ¹⁴For since we believe that Jesus died and rose again, even so, through Jesus, God will bring with him those who have died. ¹⁵For this we declare to you by the word of the Lord, that we who are alive, who are left until the coming of the Lord, will by no means precede those who have died. ¹⁶For the Lord himself, with a cry of command, with the archangel's call and with the sound of God's trumpet, will descend from heaven, and the dead in Christ will rise first. ¹⁷Then we who are alive, who are left, will be caught up in the clouds together with them to meet the Lord in the air; and so we will be with the Lord forever. ¹⁸Therefore encourage one another with these words.

SERVICE OVERVIEW: TRUSTING IN GOD; TRUSTING WITH GOD

Human beings are created to be in relationship with one another and with God. No one functions completely outside the context of relationships. From the moment we are born we are thrust into relationship with people around us - the people who delivered us, our family, and God. When we enter this world we do so forming relationships right from the start.

Healthy relationships require a lot of work and care. In particular, relationships require trust to grow and become mature. Relationships rooted in trust can bring out the best in us. Relationships rooted in anything else can bring out the worst.

Today's readings give us the chance to consider the trust required in the relationship between God and God's people. Give thought to the consequences of replacing trust with something else like your identity, your work, or trusting only yourself for sustenance rather than God. Paul reminds us that our relationship with God is cause for joy, even in the midst of sorrow, since we believe (trust) God's promise of eternal life through the living Lord Jesus.

THEOLOGICAL REFLECTION:

The readings in November deal with the end: the conclusion of the liturgical year, one's own death, the end of the earth as we know it, and even the "dying" of vegetation as the seasons change. At the end of everything is God, and in the readings we encounter God arriving for us, the promised feast begun in our meal of bread and wine. Welcome to worship! Wake! Awake! Join the bridesmaids at the table of the wedding feast Christ provides. Explore and wonder about what it means to live together in community.

The wedding feast is a biblical image of our lives with God. Modern times are far removed from the cultural aspect of bridal parties greeting the groom and lighting the way for the traditional days-long celebration we encounter in today's gospel. How might we hear this parable in a more contemporary way? Have you ever been in a situation where you thought you were prepared but really you were not? In our corner of the world, we anticipate and plan for bad weather. Like a hurricane blowing through, our lives are disrupted by things that are outside of our control. Do not immediately fall into the wisdom/foolishness or prepared/unprepared dichotomies that are obvious in this text, though. Look beyond that to the relationship the bridesmaids have with one another. How might this story encourage us to help each other anticipate challenges, watch out for one another, and light the way for one another? Jesus shares that there will be unexpected aspects, chaos, and adjustments to be made. If we understand that those things are part of God's plan, is fear, frustration, and lack of attention to God's in-breaking reign lessened or removed altogether?

We can all identify with surprises that happen in life when we are caught unprepared. Yet so much of life is about having new experiences that lead to growth, change, and deeper understanding. Connecting the concept of preparation with the story of the bridesmaids, we are reminded that Jesus' breaking into our lives can come when we least expect it. With Advent approaching and our culture already preparing for Christmas, all these preparations point to our need to rely on God to be a constant source of peace and love, despite the swirling responsibilities of life.

KID STUDY:

Today's story is about a wedding! In Jesus's time, bridesmaids didn't stay with the bride like they do today. Instead, they traveled to the wedding with the groom, carrying oil lamps to light his way. The bridesmaids in today's story are not prepared – their lamps ran out of oil so they had no light! Some bridesmaids brought extra oil to keep their lights shining. Jesus tells this story to help us see that how we live and shine God's light matters for showing others about Jesus' love. What are ways that we can help each other have enough oil in our lamps to shine God's light?

When we remember that we are children of God, we can share God's light with other people by being Jesus's hands and feet.

INDIVIDUAL REFLECTION:

The foolish maidens were foolish because they expected everything to be on schedule. No delays. The foolish didn't anticipate a sudden change of plan. They didn't prepare for every possible contingency so as to insure their presence at the feast. They didn't realize that this feast was everything, that to be there called for investment of one's total being and every resource - surplus included. The foolish didn't know the importance of the meal. What now are the expectations of your heart? How do you rank this feast? Are you here for a taste, or are you here to be dazzled by a foretaste? Foolish are you, or are you wise? Expecting a delay, we are all tempted to look here, there and everywhere for a taste of something, of something - how should we day - divine. Foolish ones, we seek here a morsel which will supply relief from the complexities of schedule and vocation. A taste among many. But the wise were wise because they brought a flask of extra oil. Large quantities of oil in single flasks. It didn't matter that there might be other feasts, other seeming purposes to life. These had no value. There was nothing else for which to save the oil. This feast was everything. This bridegroom was worth feasting with. To be wise today is to receive the power of the signs. - Mark P. Bangert [Mark P. Bangert, Homilies for the Christian People, ed.
