Thursday, November 23, 2023 Clement, Bishop of Rome, died around 100

Clement was the third bishop of Rome. He is best remembered for a letter he wrote to the congregation in Corinth, still struggling with the same problems that led to Paul's letters to them. As did Paul, he focused on the need for love among Christians.

Thursday, November 23, 2023 Miguel Agustín Pro, martyr, died 1927

Pro grew up in a time when the Mexican revolutionaries accused the church of siding with the wealthy. He became a Jesuit priest, and worked on behalf of the poor and homeless. Falsely accused of throwing a bomb at a government official, he was executed, but not before crying out "Long live Christ the King!"

Friday, November 24, 2023 Justus Falckner, died 1723; Jehu Jones, died 1852; William Passavant, died 1894; pastors in North America

Not only was Falckner the first Lutheran ordained in North America, but he published a catechism which was the first Lutheran book published on the continent. Jones was the Lutheran church's first African American pastor and carried out missionary work in Philadelphia which led to the formation there of the first African American Lutheran congregation (St. Paul's). William Passavant helped to establish hospitals and orphanages in a number of cities and was the first to introduce deaconesses to the work of hospitals in the United States.

Saturday, November 25, 2023 Isaac Watts, hymnwriter, died 1748

Thought by many to be the greatest hymnwriter in the English language, Watts as a youth was critical of the quality of the metrical psalter of the time. He wrote about 600 hymns—many based on the psalms, but others that are not.

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OTHER READINGS: Zephaniah 1:7, 12-18

Zephaniah (like the prophet Amos in last week's first reading) presents the day of the LORD as one of judgment and wrath. Descriptions of the last day in the New Testament include details taken from Old Testament accounts of the day of the LORD.

The reading begins:

⁷Be silent before the Lord GoD! For the day of the LORD is at hand; the LORD has prepared a sacrifice, he has consecrated his guests. ¹²At that time I will search Jerusalem with lamps, and I will punish the people who rest complacently on their dregs, those who say in their hearts, "The Lord will not do good, nor will he do harm." ¹³Their wealth shall be plundered, and their houses laid waste. Though they build houses, they shall not inhabit them; though they plant vineyards, they shall not drink wine from them. ¹⁴The great day of the LORD is near, near and hastening fast; the sound of the day of the LORD is bitter, the warrior cries aloud there. ¹⁵That day will be a day of wrath, a day of distress and anguish, a day of ruin and devastation, a day of darkness and gloom, a day of clouds and thick darkness, ¹⁶a day of trumpet blast and battle cry against the fortified cities and against the lofty battlements. ¹⁷I will bring such distress upon people that they shall walk like the blind; because they have sinned against the LORD, their blood shall be poured out like dust, and their flesh like dung. ¹⁸Neither their silver nor their gold will be able to save them on the day of the LORD's wrath; in the fire of his passion the whole earth shall be consumed; for a full, a terrible end he will make of all the inhabitants of the earth.

PSALM: Psalm 90:1-8 [9-11] 12

¹Lord, you have been our refuge from one generation to another. ²Before the mountains were brought forth, or the land and the earth were born, from age to age you are God. ³You turn us back to the dust and say, "Turn back, O children of earth." ⁴For a thousand years in your sight are like yesterday when it is past and like a watch in the night; ⁵you sweep them away like a dream, they fade away suddenly like the grass: ⁶in the morning it is green and flourishes; in the evening it is dried up and withered. ⁷For we are consumed by your anger; we are afraid because of your wrath. ⁸Our iniquities you have set before you, and our secret sins in the light of your countenance. [⁹When you are angry, all our days are gone; we bring our years to an end like a sigh. ¹⁰The span of our life is seventy years, perhaps in strength even eighty; yet the sum of them is but labor and sorrow, for they pass away quickly and we are gone. ¹¹Who regards the power of your wrath? Who rightly fears your indignation?] ¹²So teach us to number our days that we may apply our hearts to wisdom.

OTHER READINGS: 1 Thessalonians 5:1-11

Though we do not know and cannot calculate the day of Christ's return, we live faithfully in the here and now as we anticipate the day when we will be given eternal salvation through our Lord Jesus Christ.

The reading begins:

¹Now concerning the times and the seasons, brothers and sisters, you do not need to have anything written to you. ²For you yourselves know very well that the day of the Lord will come like a thief in the night. ³When they say, "There is peace and security," then sudden destruction will come upon them, as labor pains come upon a pregnant woman, and there will be no escape! ⁴But you, beloved, are not in darkness, for that day to surprise you like a thief; ⁵for you are all children of light and children of the day; we are not of the night or of darkness. ⁶So then let us not fall asleep as others do, but let us keep awake and be sober; ⁷for those who sleep sleep at night, and those who are drunk get drunk at night. ⁸But since we belong to the day, let us be sober, and put on the breastplate of faith and love, and for a helmet the hope of salvation. ⁹For God has destined us not for wrath but for obtaining salvation through our Lord Jesus Christ, ¹⁰who died for us, so that whether we are awake or asleep we may live with him. ¹¹Therefore encourage one another and build up each other, as indeed you are doing.

SERVICE OVERVIEW: AWAKE TO THE GRACE OF GOD

Jesus' parable of the talents invites a full-hearted response to God's lavish gifts of faith and purpose. We as people of God are meant to be engaged, alert, and ready to share what we have received from our prodigally (wastefully) generous God. While this parable is sometimes interpreted in the context of judgment, read it carefully. Do you see the beauty of the faith-generated response to God's lavish grace?

That is the definition of stewardship! Presented in light of God's gift of faith and purpose, this "churchy" term can today be transformed to new understanding in the proclamation of the gospel text. Instead of the weight of obligation and duty we so often associate with religion, we are invited today to another way – to be fully awake to the grace of God.

THEOLOGICAL REFLECTION:

Today's parable about the talents asks us to contemplate why some people do a good job of using their talents to benefit others and some never employ their talents to the full. Welcome to worship! Hear God's call to righteous living. Receive the salvation that God wills for you. Come to the table and be strengthened to become an ever more creative, faithful servant in God's kingdom.

What does it mean to be awake to the grace of God? On the surface Jesus' parable is a simple premise: the contrast of workers who please and workers who disappoint their master. Money in the parable, called a "talent" is contrasted with our English word "talent" meaning a person's natural ability. A common use of this parable is to stress what Lutherans call *law*: we are obligated to use our talents to the best of our ability. The parable also proclaims what Lutherans

call *gospel*: all good comes from God, who provides us far more than we need. God's grace is given in abundance for our use.

God has been the dwelling place of the people from generation to generation. It is from this promise that we as a community seek to gain a heart of wisdom and compassion - to become the dwelling place for God in the world. Can you recall a time when you felt the presence of God providing refuge? Were you the provider or the receiver? Can you recall at time when you became a place of safety for someone else? Share and celebrate each other's varied talents! They give voice to and provide depth to our faith. Our talents give space for the Spirit to breathe!

Here is a new idea about talents offered by the Roman Catholic priest and Old Testament professor Robert Schoenstene having to do with the weight of the talents. A talent was a measure, often comprised of gold or silver, and could weigh up to fifty pounds. A talent was heavy. For early Jewish listeners the weight or heaviness of a talent would likely invoke the Hebrew word *kabod*, which means heavy, weighty, powerful, but also refers to glory, dignity, gravitas. Leaning into this interpretation, the place most associated with weight and glory was God's mercy seat in the temple - the heaviest and most powerful place in revealing God's presence. If we backtrack to the recipients in the parable, the question might be posed as to whether they have been entrusted with the weight of God's mercy. Mercy is not to be hidden away, but rather is to be made known in community for the sake of the other. If people hide mercy, are they failing at one of the great splendors and heaviest tasks God is entrusting to people? Might Jesus be telling this parable to proclaim the reign of God's mercy and our call to steward that mercy for the sake of others?

KID STUDY:

Jesus tells the parable of the talents, the servants who manage them, and the master who responds to their efforts. Knowing that all we have comes from God, what do you have that you can offer in service? You are old enough to serve your church! Read, sing, light candles, or volunteer to bring the bag for the children's sermon. When it comes to being the hands and feet of Jesus, you are just as important as any grown up. Sometimes, there is social pressure at school to act like everyone else and play down your preferences or individual abilities, but remember that God calls you to "bloom where you are planted". Embrace who you are, what you like, and all the ways you use your gifts to bring God into the world.

INDIVIDUAL REFLECTION:

The soul is like a housewife who has put all her household in good order and prudently arranged it and well disposed it; she has taken good care that nothing will damage it, her provision for the future is wise, she knows exactly what she is going, she acquires and discards, she does what is proper, she avoids mistakes, and always she knows how everything should be. So it is with the soul: the soul is all love, and love rules in the soul, mighty and powerful, working and resting, doing and not doing, and all which is in the soul and comes to the soul is according to Love's will. For it is Love's power that has seized the soul and led it, sheltered and protected it, given it prudence and wisdom and the sweetness and the strength which belong to love. Like the fish, swimming in the vast sea and resting in its deeps, and like the bird, boldly mounting high in the

sky, so the soul feels its spirit freely moving through the vastness and the depth and the unutterable richness of Love. - Beatrice of Nazareth [Beatrice of Nazareth, trans.
