INTRODUCTION

The prophet Jeremiah speaks of the incurable wound of his suffering yet finds in God's words the delight of his heart. When Peter doesn't grasp Jesus' words about suffering, Jesus tells the disciples they will find their lives in losing them. Such sacrificial love is described by Paul when he urges us to associate with the lowly and not repay evil with evil. In worship we gather as a community that we might offer ourselves for the sake of our suffering world.

FIRST READING: Jeremiah 15:15-21

A Our first reading is from Jeremiah, chapter 15, verses 15-21.

Jeremiah's delight in the word of the LORD is contradicted by the heaviness of God's hand upon him and God's seeming unfaithfulness. God's tough love to Jeremiah says that if he repents, he will be allowed to continue in his strenuous ministry. Jeremiah is strengthened by the simple words, "I am with you."

The reading begins:

¹⁵O LORD, you know; remember me and visit me, and bring down retribution for me on my persecutors. In your forbearance do not take me away; know that on your account I suffer insult.

¹⁶Your words were found, and I ate them, and your words became to me a joy and the delight of my heart; for I am called by your name, O LORD, God of hosts. ¹⁷I did not sit in the company of merrymakers, nor did I rejoice; under the weight of your hand I sat alone, for you had filled me with indignation. ¹⁸Why is my pain unceasing, my wound incurable, refusing to be healed?

Truly, you are to me like a deceitful brook, like waters that fail. ¹⁹Therefore thus says the LORD: If you turn back, I will take you back, and you shall stand before me. If you utter what is precious, and not what is worthless, you shall serve as my mouth. It is they who will turn to you, not you who will turn to them. ²⁰And I will make you to this people a fortified wall of bronze; they will fight against you, but they shall not prevail over you, for I am with you to save you and

deliver you, says the LORD. ²¹I will deliver you out of the hand of the wicked, and redeem you from the grasp of the ruthless.

PSALM: Psalm 26:1-8

A The Psalm today is from Psalm 26, verses 1-8. We will read the Psalm responsively. The congregation will please respond by reading the words in bold print.

²Test me, O LORD, and try me; examine my heart and my mind.

³For your steadfast love is before my eyes; I have walked faithfully with you.

⁵I have hated the company of evildoers; I will not sit down with the wicked.

⁶I will wash my hands in innocence, O LORD, that I may go in procession round your altar,

⁷singing aloud a song of thanksgiving and recounting all your wonderful deeds.

⁸LORD, I love the house in which you dwell and the place where your glory abides.

SECOND READING: Romans 12:9-21

A Our second reading is from Romans, chapter 12, verses 9-21.

Paul presents benchmarks for faithful relationships with Christians and non-Christians. Love is the unflagging standard of our behavior. When we encounter evil, we do not resort to its tactics but seek to overcome it with good. While Christians cannot control the actions and attitudes of others, we seek to live at peace with all people.

⁹Let love be genuine; hate what is evil, hold fast to what is good; ¹⁰love one another with mutual affection; outdo one another in showing honor. ¹¹Do not lag in zeal, be ardent in spirit, serve the Lord. ¹²Rejoice in hope, be patient in suffering, persevere in prayer. ¹³Contribute to the needs of the saints; extend hospitality to strangers. ¹⁴Bless those who persecute you; bless and do not curse them. ¹⁵Rejoice with those who rejoice, weep with those who weep. ¹⁶Live in harmony with one another; do not be haughty, but associate with the lowly; do not claim to be wiser than you are. ¹⁷Do not repay anyone evil for evil, but take thought for what is noble in the sight of all. ¹⁸If it is possible, so far as it depends on you, live peaceably with all. ¹⁹Beloved, never avenge yourselves, but leave room for the wrath of God; for it is written, "Vengeance is mine, I will repay, says the Lord." ²⁰No, "if your enemies are hungry, feed them; if they are thirsty, give them something to drink; for by doing this you will heap burning coals on their heads." ²¹Do not be overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good.

After Peter confesses that Jesus is "the Messiah, the Son of the living God" (16:16), Jesus reveals the ultimate purpose of his ministry. These words prove hard to accept, even for a disciple whom Jesus has called a "rock."

You are a stumbling block to me; for you are setting your mind not on divine things but on human things." ²⁴Then Jesus told his disciples, "If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. ²⁵For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake will find it. ²⁶For what will it profit them if they gain the whole world but forfeit their life? Or what will they give in return for their life? ²⁷"For the Son of Man is to come with his angels in the glory of his Father, and then he will repay everyone for what has been done. ²⁸Truly I tell you, there are some standing here who will not taste death before they see the Son of Man coming in his kingdom."

* **FAVORITE HYMN:** **“Here I Am, Lord”** by Dan Schutte

Dan Schutte, a 31-year-old Jesuit song composer, was asked by a friend to write a song for a diaconate ordination Mass. The friend wanted the song to include images of the Word of God, the Light of Christ, and the bread and wine of holy communion.

Even though he had been suffering with the flu, he consented. He then realized that he had only a few days to write the song, and he had no idea how to include all those images in one song. So, he sat with his guitar and blank sheet of paper. . . and prayed, “God, if I'm going to do this for my friend, you're going to have to help me.” Much like God helped the prophet Jeremiah, God helped Dan provide the words and melody for this song which was completed in two days!

He said, “I didn't plan for the song to become so special to so many people. . . reaching people of all walks of life. . . and encouragement to anyone struggling with life choices.”

The song has received mixed reviews; “Love it and hate it, most Catholics could probably sing 'Here I Am, Lord' from memory.” Mr. Schutte said it is very humbling and **“way, way** beyond anything I have tried to do alone”.

UPCOMING COMMEMORATIONS

Saturday, September 9, 2023 Peter Claver, priest, missionary to Colombia, died 1654

Born into Spanish nobility, Claver became a Jesuit missionary, and served in present-day Colombia. His ministry was focused on the enslaved people who arrived there. He gave them food and medicine, learned their dialects, and taught them Christianity.

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SERVICE OVERVIEW: THERE MUST BE ANOTHER WAY!

Peter may be the “rock” on which Christ will build the church, but when Jesus reveals the suffering that will come first, Peter becomes a tempter and “stumbling block.” Assuming God must have a different way to save the world, Peter protests Jesus’ suffering and death. Jesus explains to Peter and all his disciples that, in fact, this is the way to life: losing one’s life in order to find it.

By tempting Jesus to an easier way than his journey through suffering to resurrection, Peter personifies a temptation common to all generations of Jesus’ disciples: seeking a way to avoid “losing oneself,” instead of surrendering all to and with the one we follow. Rather than losing our lives, our selves, possessions, and time, we hold on more tightly, afraid of what will happen to our comfort, success, and identity if we let go. Those things we hold onto then become, like Peter, stumbling blocks along the way of self-giving love.

THEOLOGICAL REFLECTION:

In last week’s gospel reading, Jesus praised his disciple Peter. Today Peter is rebuked! Peter protests when he hears about the impending suffering Jesus must endure. Like Peter, it is so easy for us to react to things we cannot accept. Peter’s problem is that he sees only the suffering and death without grasping the new life that comes through it. Welcome to worship! Receive the life that only Jesus can give.

This is the way of our God who becomes human in Jesus: emptying himself of power and dignity and losing his very own life for the sake of the world’s life. Like Peter, we also believe that surely God must have an easier way than the way of self-giving love, especially in times when we too are tempted by worldly ways of comfort and success. Jesus’ love for Peter (and us) is too real and too strong to allow us to be distant from the realities of the cross. How do we deny ourselves, pick up our cross, and follow Jesus in our current lives?

To stand at the foot of the cross, to witness the suffering of an innocent man, is to be humbled in a profound way. We don’t acknowledge the suffering of others. Can you identify communal and structural sins that keep us from a life of wholeness and connection? How does picking up our own cross involve witness, restoration, healing, and connection?

To take up a cross as Jesus did is to stand, always, in the center of the world’s pain. It’s difficult, but have you ever considered a mindset that your comfort isn’t worth it unless the least and the lost can share in it, too? In what ways might this resonate with how you relate and how we relate as a church community to the surrounding community? How might this call to stand in solidarity

and embody the discomfort of people often placed at the margins of society help you understand taking up your cross daily?

KID STUDY:

You have potential. What does that mean? It means you have things that make you special and abilities that can be developed that will lead to making the world a better place. Jesus sees great potential in you. That is why he has called you to become his *disciple*, or *student*. Will it be easy? No. Jesus once told his followers that to be his disciple would be very difficult. *"If any of you want to be my follower, you must forget about yourself, take up your cross, and follow me."* He meant that to be Jesus's hands and feet, we have to learn to get out of our comfort zone. We have to figure out all the gifts each of us has been given to serve our world. We have to learn to forgive other people who sin against us. We have to take care of people who need our help. None of these things are easy or convenient, but when we do the work and share God's love with the world, we will know the real joy that comes from being a follower of Jesus.

INDIVIDUAL REFLECTION:

*The cross is laid on every Christian. As we embark upon discipleship we surrender ourselves to Christ in union with his death—we give over our lives to death. Thus it begins: the cross is not the terrible end to an otherwise god fearing and happy life, but it meets us at the beginning of our communion with Christ. When Christ calls a man, he bids him come and die. But we do not want to die, and therefore Jesus Christ and his call are necessarily our death as well as our life. As Christ bears our burdens, so ought we to bear the burdens of our fellowman. The law of Christ, which it is our duty to fulfill, is the bearing of the cross. My brother's burden which I must bear is not only his outward life, his natural characteristics and gifts, but quite literally his sin. The call to follow Christ always means a call to share the word of forgiveness - the Christlike suffering which it is the Christian's duty to bear. - Dietrich Bonhoeffer [Dietrich Bonhoeffer, *The Cost of Discipleship* (NY: Macmillan, 1963), 99-100.]*
